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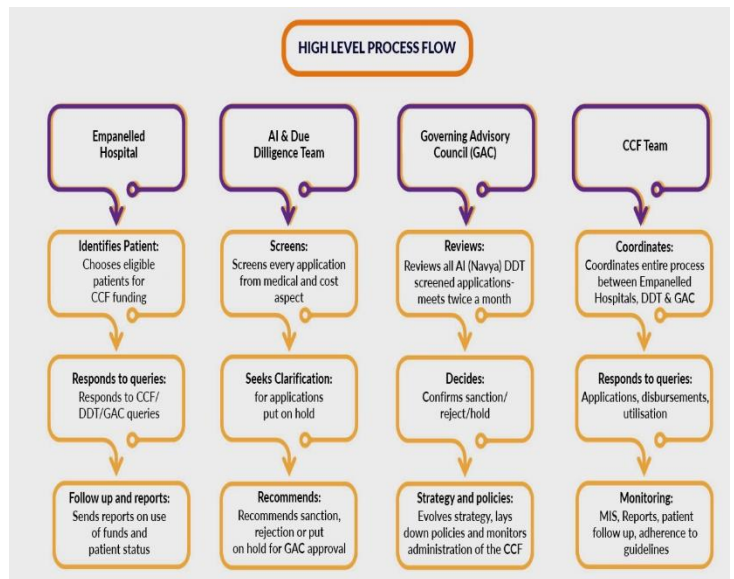
Background

2011-2020, financial aid of USD 4.9 Million was provided to 2514 paediatric patient across 19 empaneled hospitals in India.



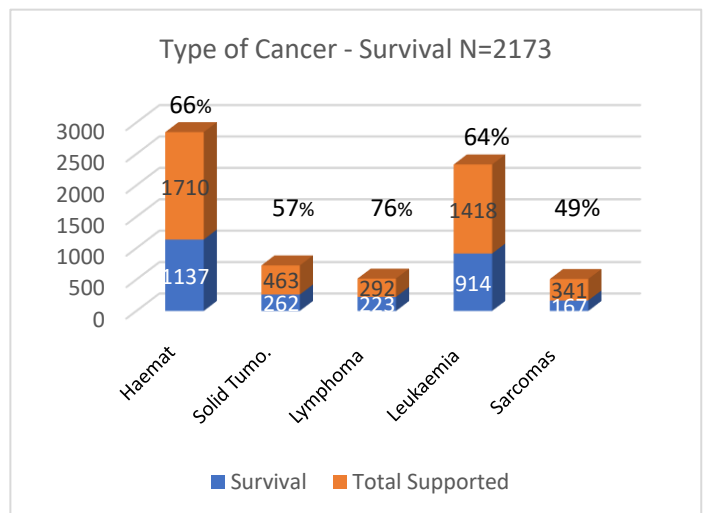
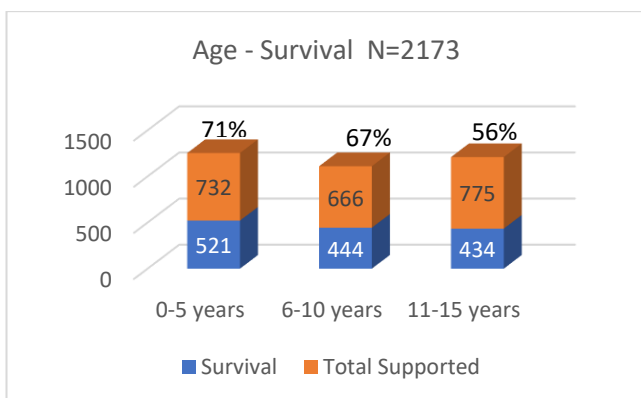
Methodology

Prospective phone follow up was conducted in 2173/2514 (86%) beneficiaries to report outcomes.



Results

At a median follow-up of 4.7 years, 1399/2173 (64%) were alive and disease-free.



Conclusion

Prospective long-term structured follow-up remains a significant challenge in Indian health-care system, our major achievement is the feasibility in the majority.
